OUR HISTORY: CELEBRATING 80 YEARS

In early 1946, a group of veterans returned from the battlefield to a grateful nation, but also to a world unprepared for their needs. Unable to access their homes, navigate public transportation, or fully participate in society, they faced barriers at every turn. Refusing to be limited by their injuries, they met and with the courage, conviction, and grit that embodies the heart of service together they changed the course of disability rights in America forever. Paralyzed Veterans of America was born from that meeting.

Today, 80 years later, PVA remains member-led and mission driven, and that same spirit of determination and lived experience continues to guide everything PVA does. With more than 70 offices in 33 Chapters nationwide, PVA now proudly serves hundreds of thousands of veterans with spinal cord injuries and diseases, like MS and ALS, as well as their families across the U.S., including Puerto Rico. Its reach also extends far beyond the veteran population, making its mark on the greater disability community.

Educational Student Scholarship Program

Introduction

The goal of this scholarship program is to assist in providing education and training for veterans with spinal cord injury and diseases of the central nervous system as well as members of their families.

The Paralyzed Veterans of America North Central Chapter will review all applications and will determine the amount of funding each applicant will receive.

Eligible Applicants

1. All applicants must be citizens of the United States.
2. Applicants must be accepted or enrolled as a full-time student at any accredited college, university, vocational school or online courses in the United States.
3. Applicants must complete their first year of post-secondary study prior to application. Under no circumstances will scholarship awards be given for more than two (2) years.
4. Preference will be given to applicants pursuing degrees as Registered Nurses, Occupational Therapists and Physical Therapists.
5. Scholarship recipients must notify PVA North Central Chapter if they are no longer enrolled in school.
6. Selection shall be made without regard to race, color, religion, sex, national origin, age, disability, veteran status.
7. If the member is deceased, applications will be denied unless the member was active with the Chapter.

General Guidelines

Amount of funds available will be determined by the PVA North Central Chapter Board of Directors. Scholarships will vary according to the number and merit of applications received and the total funds available. At no time will a grant exceed \$1,000.00 per academic year.

Students must provide a copy of the transcript of grades from the previous semester in order to obtain funding for the upcoming semester. Checks will be made payable to the college. Under no circumstances will payment be made to the student.

Students will receive one half the scholarship amount each semester after providing their previous grade transcript (must obtain a 2.0 or more g.p.a.), registration, and proof of enrollment.

Application forms may be obtained from the PVA North Central Chapter, 209 N. Garfield Ave., Sioux Falls, SD 57104.

Applications must be postmarked by August 1st. There will be no exceptions.

GOVERNMENT RELATIONS

PVA Holds Annual Advocacy/Legislation Seminar

On June 9-11, PVA held the 2026 Advocacy Legislation Seminar in Washington, DC. Over 175 PVA members and chapter leaders and staff participated in the event. During our Hill visits, attendees visited the offices of approximately 300 members of Congress. PVA's Seminar-focused priorities included preserving VA's spinal cord injuries and disorders system of care, codifying and improving VA's Bowel and Bladder program, increasing Special Monthly Compensation for the most severely disabled veterans, and raising survivor benefits. We encourage all PVA members and their families to continue engaging with their members of Congress through PVAAction Force to keep the momentum moving on our priorities.

S. 3647, the Disabled Veterans Dignity Act

This bill would create a permanent VA bowel and bladder care program for veterans with SCI/D. The bill expands caregiver support, standardizes services, and helps prevent serious health complications while improving veterans' independence and quality of life.

H.R. 6047, the Sharri Briley and Eric Edmundson Veterans Benefits Expansion Act

This bill would modernize Special Monthly Compensation (SMC) rates for severely disabled veterans and strengthen Dependency and Indemnity Compensation (DIC) for surviving families. The legislation aims to better reflect today's cost of living, address outdated benefit structures, and provide greater financial stability for veterans and their families.

H.R. 1685/S. 749, THE JUSTICE FOR ALS VETERANS ACT

THIS BILL ENSURES THE SURVIVING SPOUSES OF VETERANS WHO DIED OF SERVICE-CONNECTED ALS ARE ELIGIBLE FOR INCREASED SURVIVOR BENEFITS. SURVIVING SPOUSES OF ALS VETERANS ARE RARELY ABLE TO QUALIFY FOR THE DIC “KICKER” BECAUSE OF THE QUICK PROGRESSION OF THE DISEASE.

H.R. 6835/S. 3988, THE VETERANS STAND ACT

THIS BILL ENSURES VETERANS WITH SCI/D RECEIVE CONSISTENT, COMPREHENSIVE HEALTH EVALUATIONS AND ARE CONSIDERED FOR INNOVATIVE TREATMENTS THAT COULD ENHANCE THEIR MOBILITY, INDEPENDENCE, AND QUALITY OF LIFE.

VA ADAPTIVE SPORTS & ARTS

DID YOU KNOW VA PROVIDES VETERANS WITH OPPORTUNITIES FOR HEALTH AND HEALING THROUGH ADAPTIVE SPORTS AND THERAPEUTIC ART PROGRAMS? THESE SPECIALIZED REHABILITATION EVENTS AIM TO OPTIMIZE VETERANS’ INDEPENDENCE, COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT, WELL-BEING, AND QUALITY OF LIFE.

Veterans may be eligible for TSA Pre-Check at no cost

Eligible Veterans for the TSA Pre-Check enrollment fee waiver are those who VA has determined to have a service-connected disability requiring the use of a VA-issued wheelchair or prosthetic limb, due to loss or loss of use of an extremity, full or partial paralysis, or permanent blindness. Eligible Veterans must also be enrolled in VA healthcare.

If you meet the eligibility requirements above, follow these steps:

Sign into your VA account. If you don't have a verified VA account, you can create an account by following the instructions online.

Under the Benefits and Healthcare dropdown, select Records, then click Download your VA benefits letters.

Click the link, Get your VA benefit letters.

or

Access VA benefit letters and select the button to Sign in or create an account.

Please note that receiving this letter does not guarantee free TSA PreCheck enrollment. In addition to meeting the minimum eligibility requirements under the VETS Safe Travel Act, you must meet TSA's standard citizenship and security requirements, including a background check.

Veterans may be ineligible due to incomplete or false application information, certain violations of federal security regulations, or disqualifying criminal offenses and other factors. TSA shall waive the enrollment fee subject to availability of funds.

If you wish to take advantage of this benefit, please visit TSA online for detailed instructions on completing your enrollment. You must provide a copy of your letter during the TSA Pre-Check enrollment process.

Regardless of whether you meet the requirements for a free TSA Pre-Check enrollment, if you are a Veteran with a disability and need extra assistance at security screenings, you can request help through TSA Cares. For more information on TSA Cares, call (855) 787-2227. Please contact TSA at least 72 hours prior to travel for any questions about screening policies, procedures and what to expect at security checkpoints.

From the Office of Brad Friez

National Service Officer

I wanted to begin with a few housekeeping items before getting into the upcoming huge celebration of our country. Just wanted to remind Veterans that to have any chance at obtaining a service-connected rating on a condition, one of the first items of business is to ensure that the condition you wish to file for is listed on your problem list; be it on your list at the VA or if being treated by a private medical provider that it is indeed reflected on that list. This problem list is a list of chronic health issues. VA will never rate a Veteran for acute health issues. It seems their definition of chronic is at least 6 months in duration. Also, we continue to receive calls from Veterans who do not leave a message and on rare occasions do not identify themselves. Please give us your name and phone number so we can respond to your issue in a timely manner. And because we are a small office, it is best to set up an appointment. Lastly, when an Intent to File a Claim Form is submitted, this is a pre-cursor to the claim but not the claim and we have one year from the date that form is submitted to file the actual claim form. Sometimes, Veterans are under the impression that an Intent to File form submitted is the actual claim, and it is not. You will receive a form letter from the VA acknowledging the Intent to File, and give the date that is reflective of the day they received that form.

Not exactly sure of the timing of this PVA North Central Chapter Newsletter but hoping it happens before the 4th of July. As everyone knows this coming 4th of July is the 250th anniversary of our nation. Wanted to give you a little historical background on our country's Declaration of Independence and other facts of our country's beginning.

At the time of the Declaration of Independence on July 4, 1776 the colonies had actually been at conflict with Great Britain for over one year. The battles at Lexington and Concord Massachusetts were fought in April of 1775.

On June 11, 1776 the Second Continental Congress chose the Committee of Five to produce the Declaration. Members of that Committee of Five were Thomas Jefferson, John Adams, Benjamin Franklin, Roger Sherman, and Robert R. Livingston. John Adams convinced the other members of the Committee of Five to allow Jefferson to be the primary author of the Declaration. He and the Committee completed the rough draft of the Declaration of Independence on June 28, 1776.

Then on July 2, 1776 the Second Continental Congress approved Richard Henry Lee's proposal for independence, officially declaring independence from Great Britain. After two days of debate and editing the final draft of the Declaration of Independence was unanimously ratified it on July 4, 1776 while they were meeting at the Pennsylvania State House in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. This building is now called Independence Hall.

The Declaration was first published on July 6, 1776 by The Pennsylvania Evening Post. Public readings of the Declaration happened simultaneously at noon and at 3pm on July 8, 1776 in Trenton, NJ, Easton, PA, and in Philadelphia, PA.

At the time of the Second Continental Congress General George Washington was in New York preparing for a possible attack by the British. He was sent a copy of the Declaration on July 8th and on July 9th he shared the Declaration with his troops.

Actual signing of the Declaration was begun on August 2, 1776. John Hancock, President of the Second Continental Congress was the first to sign the Declaration that day. Of the fifty six eventual signers of the Declaration fifty of them signed on August 2, 1776. Benjamin Franklin was the oldest to sign the Declaration at the age of seventy and Edward Rutledge was the youngest signer at the age of twenty six. The last signer was Thomas McKean who signed in January of 1777. By signing and ratifying the Declaration the signers were committing an act of high treason and this was punishable by torture and death (most likely by hanging). The signer's names were kept secret until January 18, 1777. Once their names were made public, many of them suffered property damage and at least 15 homes of theirs were destroyed. Some were captured and held as prisoners by the British.

All who signed the Declaration are referred to as Founding Fathers. Of those fifty six signers twenty three were predominantly lawyers (not to include some such as Thomas Jefferson who was also a noted plantation owner), twelve others were merchants and plantation owners, four were physicians, three were farmers, two were clergy, and one (Benjamin Franklin) was a printer. Many of those signers were involved in many different professions.

Most of us are probably not aware that our Nation's first eventual President, George Washington was not one of the signers of the Declaration. As was earlier mentioned he was leading the troops in New York at the time of the Second Continental Congress and thus was not even a delegate to the Second Continental Congress. George Washington was chosen as our Commander in Chief of the Continental Army during the Revolutionary War, was later our first President and is referred to as the Father of His Country. But he along with John Jay (an author of the Federalist Papers and first Chief Justice of the Supreme Court), Alexander Hamilton (aide-de-camp to General Washington, also an author of the Federalist Papers, the first Treasury Secretary and who began the Federalist Party), and James Madison (father of our Constitution, another of the authors of the Federalist Papers and the fourth President) were not there in Philadelphia at the time of the signing of the Declaration but are obviously considered founding fathers of our country.

Some quotes of our founders and others include:

Nathan Hale – “I only regret that I have but one life to lose for my country.”

Patrick Henry – “Give me liberty, or give me death!”

Benjamin Franklin – “We must all hang together, or assuredly we shall all hang separately.” (At the signing of the Declaration)

Thomas Jefferson – “The price of freedom is eternal vigilance.”

John Adams – “Our obligations to our country never cease but with our lives.”

George Washington – “To be prepared for war is the most effective means of preserving peace.”

Abraham Lincoln – “A house divided against itself can not stand.”

John F. Kennedy - “Ask not what your country can do for you—ask what you can do for your country.”

These quotes in many examples showed the passion these famous Americans had for our country. In the latter cases both President Lincoln and President Kennedy died in office and gave the ultimate sacrifice for our country. This last quote listed from President Kennedy encourages us as citizens of our great country to give back to that country of ours. Locally, I wanted to point out two of many of our Veterans in South Dakota who have done just that. Eugene Murphy who everyone knows as Gene or Murph is an example of giving back even after his terrible injuries in Vietnam. My understanding is that Mr. Murphy has never taken any salary from his many decades of service with the Disabled American Veterans (DAV). He was the National Commander of the DAV from 1987 to 1988 and during that time he was instrumental in beginning the DAV's National Transportation Network throughout the VA's Hospital Network. Another Veteran who is noteworthy is Donald Loudner. Mr. Loudner happened to pass away in 2025. He was the first National Commander of the Native American Indian Veterans, Inc. (NAIV) which was formed in 2004 and not given their Congressional Charter until 2024. But during that twenty years he had to travel to any Veteran events at his own expense. The NAIV represents and advocates for hundreds of tribes and thousands of Native American Veterans. Both of these strong Veteran advocates have earned many countless awards and have done much for the Veteran community not only in South Dakota but throughout our great country.

I have been encouraged by the appreciation that many fans from other countries have shown us and our country during the World Cup Soccer event that they have attended. We are still the greatest country in the World in spite of all of our flaws. I then look at the quote from President Lincoln (at the time in advance of the Civil War) and think that we are also divided as a country today but as a country we should come together so that generations from now we are still that great country that can be a light and an example to others.
